Meeting Overview

Thursday, February 27th

The 2020 program will open with the prestigious **Pediatric Leadership Development Program's (PLDP)** conference and **New Chairs Workshop**. The PLDP fellowship program aims to help develop the next generation of pediatric chairs in North America, ensuring that they will be well poised to lead our profession through the rapidly changing environment of academic medicine and health care in general. **The New Chairs Workshop** is a dynamic, day-long session, tailored specifically for those who have been Chair or Interim Chair for less than 3-years. The day will consist of both didactic lectures and table breakout discussions led by experienced Chairs.

The PLDP is open to invited eighth and ninth Cohort PLDP scholars, mentors, and committee/board members and does not include membership at large. The New Chairs Workshop has a required registration.

This year's meeting includes a session for the **Pediatric Scientist Development Program (PSDP)** and the **Canadian Child Health Clinician Scientist Program (CCHCSP)** trainees who will attend career development workshops. The PSDP operates under the aegis of AMSPDC. PSDP and CCHCSP enable pediatric fellows to undergo intensive research training with highly successful mentors in renowned research programs.

AMSPDC is hosting a day-long **workforce summit** with invited representatives from an inclusive list of pediatric organizations. The meeting will address the growing workforce concerns. AMSPDC hopes to ensure leaders of each organization has an understanding of what is happening across organizations so we all have the same knowledge. The group will use the day to collectively brainstorm and create specific next steps, by organization, to achieve agreed upon goals. The workforce summit is open to invited guests and members of AMSPDC's Workforce Action Team. This is not open to the membership at large.

A combined reception and dinner for the PLDP participants, PSDP fellows and members of the Steering and Evaluation Committee, as well as New Chair workshop attendees and speakers, will conclude the day's events.

Friday, February 28th

AMSPDC members interested in hearing new and exciting research, and chairs and residents invited to participate in the **Frontiers in Science (FIS)** program will want to arrive in time for presentations by third-year PSDP fellows. Residents contemplating careers in research find these presentations particularly exciting because they see first-hand how PSDP training develops young pediatric physician-scientists.

The **Women's Chair Luncheon** will take place offsite at 12:00pm at King's Fish House Restaurant.

FIS continues with an afternoon session devoted to research presented by faculty from different institutions. These presentations update chairs on new work that will affect us as academicians and gives PSDP fellows a chance to see other research horizons. Those invited to speak are chosen not only for their science but also for their ability to tell the story.

The FIS/PSDP program closes with posters presented by second-year PSDP fellows and CCHCSP fellows; scientific interchange with AMSPDC members and residents is a high point. The evening concludes with a dinner that brings together PSDP fellows, FIS Residents, and their sponsoring AMSPDC chairs.

Saturday, February, 29th

With the exception of the AMSPDC Women's Chair Luncheon held Friday, this will be the first day of the AMSPDC meeting and plenary session. Saturday morning begins with an open networking breakfast.

Session one, "Microbiome in Science and Medicine", includes two talks. The first, presented by Dr. Robin Knight, is entitled "Development of the Human Microbiome" and the second, presented by Dr. Elaine Hsiao, is entitled "Interactions between the Maternal Microbiome and Developing Nervous System". The session is moderated by Dr. Gaby Haddad.

The second morning session, "The Future of the Clinical Scientific Pediatric Workforce Transitioning from Theoretical to Practical as we Move Forward" will begin with Dr. Sallie Permar giving a talk entitled, "Reimaging Pediatric Training that Supports Subspecialty Research-Oriented Careers", followed by Dr. Jeffrey Hord speaking about "The Collection and Analysis of Pediatric Hematology Oncology Workforce Data", and culminating with Dr. Nancy Roizen giving a talk entitled, "Challenges to Initiatives: Examining the System to Move to Solutions". Dr. John Barnard is the moderator.

Our third and final morning session is moderated by Dr. Gaby Haddad and entitled, "Pediatric Science; where we were and where we are going". Dr. Pamela Davis begins with her talk entitled, "Underpinning our Future: Great Advances in Pediatrics" and Dr. Larry Shapiro closes the session with his talk entitled, "Future of Pediatrics as a Clinical/Scientific subspecialty". The group will then break for a brief period to pick-up their provided lunch, before returning for a working lunch.

We will then be joined by representatives from the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), American Board of Pediatrics (ABP), Children's Hospital Association (CHA) and National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD). Each representative will give a brief organizational update before opening up for a robust discussion between our panelists and audience members. Panelists include: Mr. Mark Del Monte of the AAP, Dr. David Nichols of the ABP, Mrs. Amy Knight of the CHA and Dr. Rohan Hazra of the NICHD. Dr. Sherin Devaskar will moderate this session.

Our final afternoon session is entitled, "Broadening our perspective on academic promotion beyond typical research-intensive criteria". This session contains four speakers who will each outline a different promotional track. Dr. Lisa Chamberlain will begin with her talk, "Promoting Clinical Faculty: Emerging Advocacy Scholarship", followed by Dr. Joseph St. Geme, III, giving a talk entitled, "Promotion on the Academic Clinician Track: The University of Pennsylvania System", next Dr. Robert Ross will give a talk entitled, "Advancement and Promotion of Clinical Faculty: A View from the University of California, San Diego", and culminating the session will be Dr. Archana Chatterjee giving a talk entitled, "Advancing Clinical Faculty in Academic Medicine". Dr. Brian Pate will moderate this session.

The day's program will conclude with the AMSPDC Business Meeting (AMSPDC members only) led by Dr. Sherin Devaskar. The evening will include a social networking reception with fellow chairs.

Sunday, March 1st

Sunday morning will begin with a regional networking breakfast. The final plenary focuses on Behavioral Mental Health. The session will begin with two didactic talks, followed by a panel discussion. Dr. Sheryl Kataoka will begin with her talk entitled, "Children Not Feeling Safe in School", followed by Dr. Julia McMillan giving her talk entitled, "Preparing Future Pediatricians to Meet the Mental Health Crisis". Dr. Bonita Stanton and Dr. Herman Gray will then join for a panel discussion moderated by Dr. David Rosenberg.

Dr. Sherin Devaskar will conclude the meeting with the President's Closing Remarks.

Knowing how many children there are and where they live is essential to getting those services and programs to them. That's why it's so important that every child be counted, even newborn babies.

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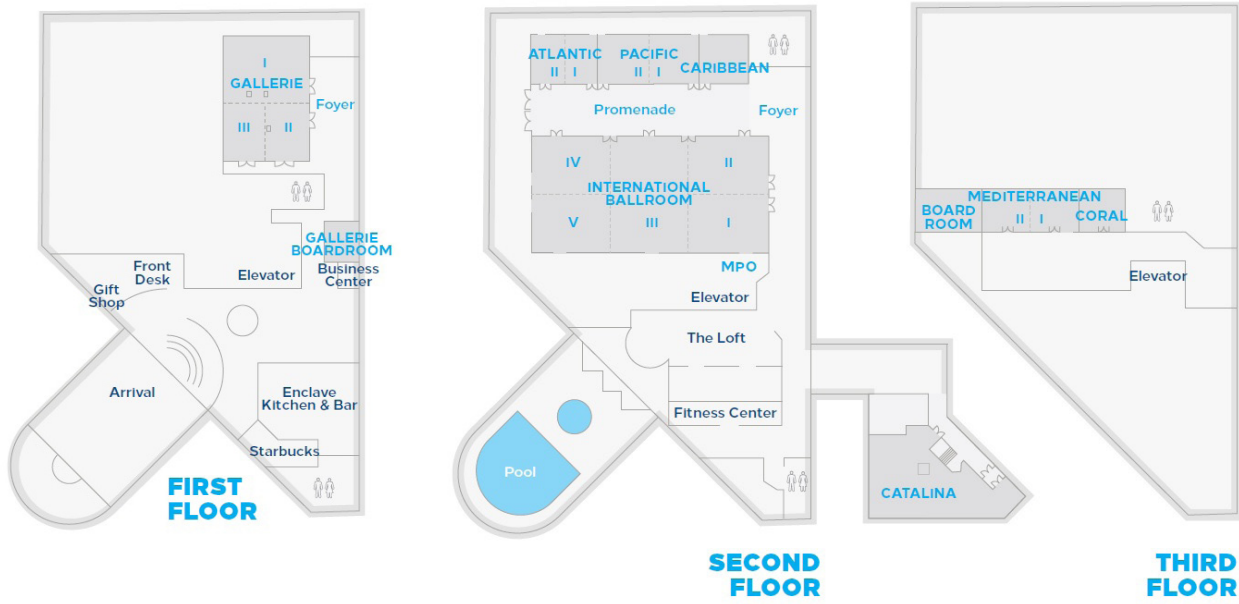
