Meeting Overview

Thursday, March 3rd

The 2016 program will open with the prestigious Pediatric Leadership Development Program's (PLDP) conference. The fellowship program aims to help develop the next generation of pediatric chairs in North America, ensuring that they will be well poised to lead our profession through the rapidly changing environment of academic medicine and health care in general.

This program is open to invited first and second cohort PLDP fellows, mentors, and committee members and does not include membership at large. PLDP program attendees will enjoy a hospitality hour and dinner Thursday night.

As in past years, this year's meeting includes a session for the Pediatric Scientist Development Program (PSDP) and the Canadian Child Health Clinician Scientist Program (CCHCSP) trainees who will attend career development workshops. The PSDP operates under the aegis of AMSPDC. PSDP and CCHCSP enable pediatric fellows to undergo intensive research training with highly successful mentors in renowned research programs.

A dinner for PSDP fellows and members of the Steering and Evaluation Committee, as well as the PLDP participants, will conclude the day's events.

Friday, March 4th

AMSPDC members interested in hearing new and exciting research, and chairs and accompanying residents invited to participate in this year's Frontiers in Science (FIS) program, will want to arrive in time for presentations by third-year PSDP fellows. Residents contemplating careers in research find these presentations particularly exciting because they see first-hand how PSDP training develops young pediatric physician-scientists.

The Women's Chair Luncheon will take place at 1:00pm in the Monterey Suite. If you did not previously register to attend, but would like to, please see the registration desk. FIS continues with an afternoon session devoted to research presented by faculty from different institutions, including AMSPDC member Wade Clapp, MD from the Indiana University School of Medicine. These presentations update chairs on new work that will affect us as academicians and gives PSDP fellows a chance to see other research horizons. Those invited to speak are chosen not only for their science but also for their ability to tell the story.

The FIS/PSDP program closes with posters presented by second-year PSDP fellows and CCHCSP fellows; scientific interchange with AMSPDC members and residents is a high point.

The evening concludes with a dinner that brings together PSDP fellows, FIS Residents, and their sponsoring AMSPDC chairs.

Saturday, March 5th

With the exception of the AMSPDC Women's Chair Luncheon held Friday, this will be the first day of the AMSPDC meeting and plenary session. Saturday morning includes an open networking breakfast designed to give chairs the chance to discuss issues of mutual interest in an informal setting.

Session one will include talks and discussions on Microbiomes moderated by Dr. Ann Reed. Dr. Patrick Seed will give a lecture on "The Maternal-Infant Dyad and the Early Life Microbiome", followed by Dr. Maria Gloria Dominguez-Bello giving her presentation on "The Early Ancestral Microbiome: Impact of Modern Practices on Development", and concluding with Dr. Martin Blaser and his presentation "Role of Early Life Antibiotics Exposure on Childhood Obesity".

The second morning session will feature a keynote address by Dr. Catherine Spong of the National Institutes of Health/NICHD entitled "NICHD: Climate and Priorities". This session will be moderated by Dr. Sherin Devaskar.

The lunchtime session will be a little different this year than in the past. It includes three different panelists broken out into three groups. Each AMSPDC member will be assigned a room, found on the back of your badge. The speakers will rotate rooms, with about 15-20 minutes per each session to allow for robust discussions. Panelists include: Dr. Karen Remley of the American Academy of Pediatrics (moderated by Dr. Teresa Quattrin), Mark Wietecha of Children's Hospital Association and Child Health Corporation of America (moderated by Dr. Richard Jacobs), and Mark Delmonte of the American Academy of Pediatrics (moderated by Dr. Scott Rivkees). The participants will all convene in the Madison Ballroom for final discussion at the end of the session (Highlights and Take-Home Points from the Lunch Session).

After the lunchtime session, the afternoon begins with the day's second keynote address on Maintenance of Certification featuring Panelists: Dr. Valerie Castle Opiari, Dr. Mira Irons, and Dr. David Nichols. This keynote will be moderated by Dr. Lewis First.

In the second afternoon session, we will hear from Dr. Laurel Leslie, Dr. Terry Stancin, and Dr. John Duby on State of the Art in Pediatric Mental Health. This session will be moderated by Dr. David Gremse and Dr. Teresa Quattrin.

The day's program will conclude with the AMSPDC Business Meeting (AMSPDC members only) led by Dr. Valerie Castle Opiari. The evening will include a reception and dinner for members of AMSPDC and their guests.

Sunday, March 6th

Sunday morning will begin with breakfast for chairs of small departments, facilitated by Dr. Timothy Fete, and large departments, facilitated by Dr. Hugh O'Brodovich. The AMSPDC Education Committee will then give their plenary with speakers Dr. Robert Vinci and Dr. Gerard Rabalais. Dr. Lewis First will moderate. After the Education Committee session, there will be a presentation from the AAAP/AMSPDC Working Group. The speakers will be Elaine Gallagher and Dr. Stephen Daniels. Dr. Daniels will also moderate this session. Lastly, the Research Committee will give a presentation with speakers Dr. Rita Ryan and Dr. Brent Polk. Dr. Polk will also moderate. Dr. Valerie Castle Opiari will then conclude the meeting with Closing Remarks.

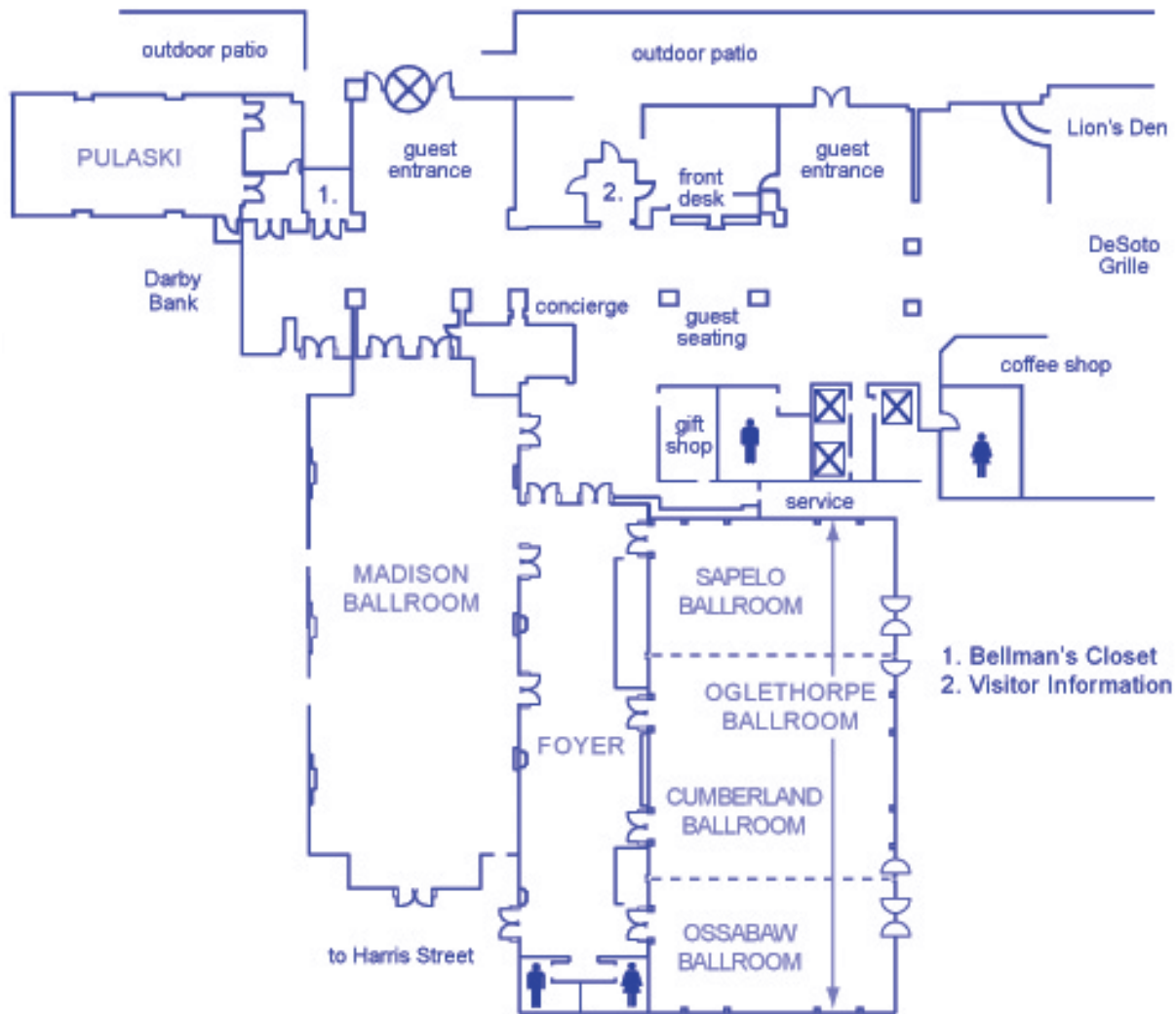

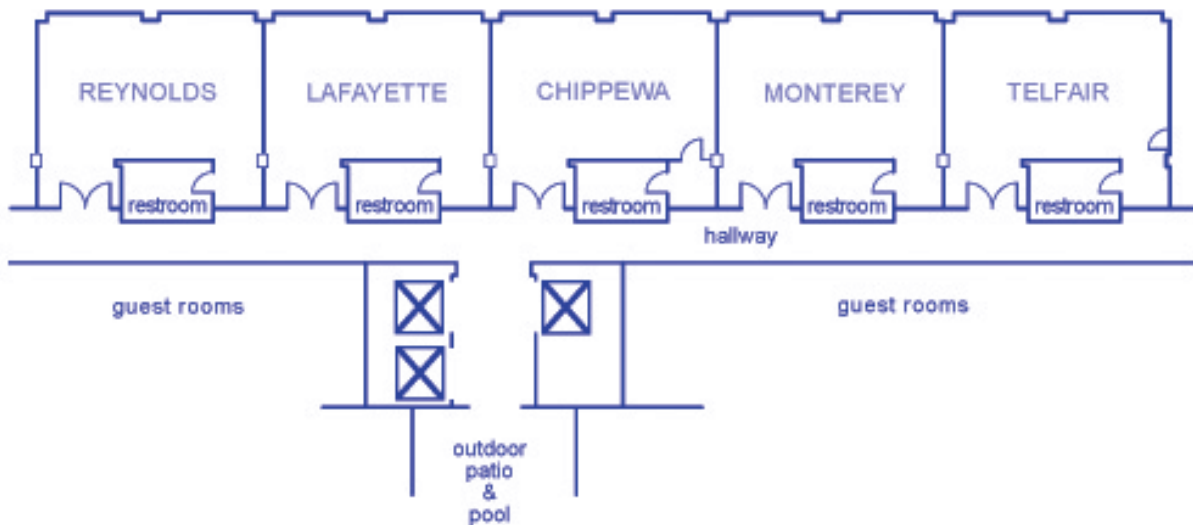
