Meeting Overview

Thursday, March 1st

The 2018 program will open with the prestigious **Pediatric Leadership Development Program's (PLDP)** conference. The fellowship program aims to help develop the next generation of pediatric chairs in North America, ensuring that they will be well poised to lead our profession through the rapidly changing environment of academic medicine and health care in general.

This program is open to invited sixth and seventh Cohort PLDP scholars, mentors, and committee/board members and does not include membership at large.

We will also be holding a workshop for New Chairs during the 2018 meeting on Thursday; special registration is required.

This year's meeting includes a session for the **Pediatric Scientist Development Program (PSDP)** and the **Canadian Child Health Clinician Scientist Program (CCHCSP)** trainees who will attend career development workshops. The PSDP operates under the aegis of AMSPDC. PSDP and CCHCSP enable pediatric fellows to undergo intensive research training with highly successful mentors in renowned research programs.

A combined reception and dinner for the PLDP participants, PSDP fellows and members of the Steering and Evaluation Committee, as well as New Chair workshop attendees and speakers, will conclude the day's events.

Friday, March 2nd

AMSPDC members interested in hearing new and exciting research, and chairs and residents invited to participate in the **Frontiers in Science (FIS)** program will want to arrive in time for presentations by third-year PSDP fellows. Residents contemplating careers in research find these presentations particularly exciting because they see first-hand how PSDP training develops young pediatric physician-scientists.

The **Women's Chair Luncheon** will take place at 1:00pm at Vyoone's restuarant. If you did not previously register to attend, but would like to, please see the registration desk.

FIS continues with an afternoon session devoted to research presented by faculty from different institutions, including AMSPDC member Ronald Cohn, MD from the University of Toronto Hospital for Sick Kids. These presentations update chairs on new work that will affect us as academicians and gives PSDP fellows a chance to see other research horizons. Those invited to speak are chosen not only for their science but also for their ability to tell the story.

The FIS/PSDP program closes with posters presented by second-year PSDP fellows and CCHCSP fellows; scientific interchange with AM-SPDC members and residents is a high point. The evening concludes with a dinner that brings together PSDP fellows, FIS Residents, and their sponsoring AMSPDC chairs.

Saturday, March 3rd

With the exception of the AMSPDC Women's Chair Luncheon held Friday, this will be the first day of the AMSPDC meeting and plenary session. Saturday morning includes an open networking breakfast designed to give chairs the chance to discuss issues of mutual interest in an informal setting. Chairs are also welcome to join Dr. Diana Bianchi for a working breakfast to determine how AMSPDC can partner with the NICHD to creatively identify new mechanisms and support for future pediatrician-scientists.

Session one will include talks and discussions on The Human Connectome moderated by Dr. Ann Reed. Dr. John Kounios will give his lecture "Creative Insight and the Brain", followed by Dr. Mirella Dapretto giving her presentation on "MRI Markers of Autism in Infancy", and concluding with Dr. Olga Tymofiyeva and her presentation "MRI Connectome of the Adolescent Brain".

The second morning session will feature a keynote address by Dr. Atul Butte from the University of California, San Francisco entitled "Translating a Trillion Points of Data into Therapies, Diagnostics, and New Insights into Disease". This session will be moderated by Dr. Teresa Quattrin.

Our final morning session will be three different speakers broken out into three groups. Each speaker will give a brief organizational update before the audience breaks out into three groups. Each AMSPDC member will be assigned a room, found on the back of your badge. The speakers will rotate rooms, with about 15 minutes per each session to allow for robust discussions. Panelists include: Dr. Karen Remley of the American Academy of Pediatrics (moderated by Dr. Scott Rivkees), Mr. Mark Wietecha of Children's Hospital Association (moderated by Dr. Mary Lee), and Dr. David Nichols of the American Board of Pediatrics (moderated by Dr. David Gremse). The participants will then break for lunch where they will have 1.5 hours. We encourage the continuity of networking over lunch with fellow colleagues. Participants are responsible for getting their own lunch.

After the lunch break, all will convene for the start of the afternoon sessions. It will begin with a NIH Address from Dr. Diana Bianchi. Dr. Sherin Devaskar will moderate this keynote.

In the second afternoon session, we will cover Workforce Challenges in Academic Pediatrics. Hearing from 3 speakers on workforce related topics, Dr. Laurel Leslie will begin by discussing "Challenges and Opportunities in the Subspecialty Workforce", Dr. Reshma Jagsi will follow by giving her talk, "Women in Pediatrics: Challenges and Opportunities" and Dr. Gary Fleisher will finish with "Shifting Demography of Pediatric Chairs: Results of the AMSPDC Survey". Tables will be labeled with various topics, participants are asked to sit at a table with a topic they are interested in. Tables will breakout and have meaningful discussion after each speaker presents. The session will culminate with each table summarizing their conversation and having Q&A discussion with our distinguished speakers.

The day's program will conclude with the AMSPDC Business Meeting (AMSPDC members only) led by Dr. Michael Artman. The evening will include a social reception and dinner for members of AMSPDC and their guests.

Sunday, March 4th

Sunday morning will begin with breakfast for chairs of small departments, facilitated by Dr. Brian Pate, and large departments, facilitated by Dr. Gabriel Haddad. Dr. Lewis First will then moderate the AMSPDC Education Committee plenary session. The final plenary session will be given by the AMSPDC Research Committee, moderated by Dr. Joseph St. Geme. Dr. Michael Artman will conclude the meeting with the President's Closing Remarks.




